

EFFECTIVE PERFORMANCE

Here are a few issues and solutions to boost site performance:

- Home page images are slow to load
 - Optimize performance by adjusting image size
- Dropdown menus are hard to read
 - Strengthen readability by changing menu backgrounds to solid colors
- CTA buttons are low contrast
 - Increase contrast with darker color choices and bold font

A good website should load quickly and be easy to read.

When there is a delay or key information is hard to see, users may be left unsatisfied.

- Pop-ups


SUPPORT AND GUIDE THE USERS PATH

Here are some issues and solutions to help users easily navigate and interact with all aspects of the website:

- Broken links in dropdown menus
 - Improve navigation issues by fixing any broken links to redirect to working pages
- Pop ups are difficult to close
 - Provide users with an easy way to close pop ups by adding an Exit or X button

These small changes to improve functionality will streamline the user experience.

The homepage is crucial as it's where users start exploring, a central hub connecting to other pages. It needs to show users what they can do and guide users to take their next steps easily.


Using human-centered design principles will not only make your site easy to use, it will reach a wider community of new users.
